# THE CURSE UPON MANKIND

We will begin by examining our lesson text by the following three homiletical points.

- The Cause (Gen.3:17a)
- The Curse (Gen.3:17b)
- The Consequences (Gen.3:17c-19)

Voice of wife Violation of Edenic Law (Gen.2:17) Vocation for life time

## This lesson will study seven aspects of the Curse on Man resulting from AOS (Adam's Original Sin).

#### 1. The [arar] curse was used to show the loss or alternation of a divinely decree blessing of Creation.

The arar curse placed upon man instituted another divine change of the heavens and earth because of Adam's Original Sin (AOS).

#### There were four factors regarding the change.

- It started with the <u>original perfect creation</u> of Gen.1:1.
- It was changed by the <u>Fall of Satan</u> (Isa.14:12-15). It became void and formless (Gen.1:2; Isa.45:18)
- Then God <u>restored the heavens and the earth</u> for the dwelling of mankind (Gen.1:3-31) (Day 6) (Gen.1:24-31) (Gen.2:8).
- <u>AOS resulted in an arar curse</u> on the heavens and earth until the Second coming of Christ (Gen.3:17-19; Heb.1:10-12; Rom.8:18-25).

#### 2. The cause of the curse on man was pronounced by God as being two-fold.

- (Gen.3:17a) "**Because** you have <u>listen (shama / kal pf) to the voice of your wife</u> and <u>have eaten (akal / kal impf)</u> from the tree about which I commanded." (Gen.2:17; 2 Cor.11:3; 1 Tim.2:14) (Ps.95:7-8; Heb.3:7)
- The curse on man (Gen.3:17-19) is different then the judgment of Gen.2:17 "Dying you shall die" (Rom.5:12-21).

#### 3. The Curse upon the ground (earth) was connected to the curse upon man.

(Gen.3:17-19) "Cursed (arar/ kal peptic) is <u>the ground</u> (ha adamah) because of you (painful toil, all the days of your life, thorns and thistles, and sweat) **until** you return to the ground."

The arar curse upon the ground is decreed until the Second Coming of Jesus Christ (Rom.8:18-25) (Creation).

Only God can change arar cursing into a divine blessing. (Heb.6:7-8; Eccl.3:9-10) (Prov.14:23; 2Thess.3:10-12).

# 4. The Calendar of the curse on man is stated as "All the days of your life" and "until you return to the ground." (Gen.3:17, 19) It is both personal and historical.

The calendar illustrates the doctrinal concept of "dying you shall die." For example, the life of Adam after his fall was 930 years and then he died physically. (Gen.5:5).

#### 5. The Challenge of the curse on man is to make a living out of a hostile environment.

(Gen.3:18) "Both thorns and thistles it shall grow for you; and you shall eat the plants of the fields."

Jesus used this doctrinal concept in two parables:

•	(Matt.13:1-9)	[Sower]	Thorny ground choked out the plants.
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• (Matt.13:22) [Sower] Worries of life and deceitfulness of wealth choked out fruitfulness)

• (Matt.13:24-30) [Tares] Sons of evil one (Matt.13:38).

#### 6. The Certainty of sweating out a living is the result of the curse on man.

(Gen.3:19) "By the sweat of your face, you shall eat bread till you return to the ground."

Solomon said that to think it something more is "chasing the wind" (Eccl.2:17-26)

(Eccl.2:17) "So I hated life, because the work that is grievous to me. All of it is meaningless, a <u>chasing</u> <u>after the wind</u>."

(Col.3: 23) "Whatever you do, do your work heartily, as for the Lord rather than for men."

"Until death do you part," could be a motto of this doctrinal concept. Retirement or unemployment does not abort or alter the arar curse on man.

## 7. The Cemetery is the one piece of ground that ends the curse on man.

(Gen.3:19) "Till you return to the ground, because from it you were taken; for you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Death has the final word on this subject because of Gen.2:17.

(Eccl.3:20) "All go to the same place; all come from dust, and to <u>dust all return</u>." (Ps.103:14-17)

(Eccl.12:7) "And the dust returns to the ground it came from, and the spirit returns to God who gave it."

(Eccl.2:24-25 "A man can do nothing better than to eat and drink and find satisfaction in his work. This too, I see, is from the hand of God, for without Him, who can eat or find enjoyment." (Eccl.5:18-19)
