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## SEVENTH DAY - GOD'S COMPLETED WORK

The Hebrew grammar of the Seventh Day introduces a messianic prophesy. It will be given in the final point of this lesson.

## This lesson will study six aspects of the Seventh Day of creation.

- The definite article was used on only two of the seven days of creation (6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup>).
  - 6 th ha/shishi
  - 7 th ha/shebii The Seventh Day is the only day of creation mentioned three times (Gen.2:2-3).

The definite article was used to show that the **6th day** was the completion of God creation work.

The definite article was used to show that 7<sup>th</sup> Day was His rest from the completed work of creation for the habitation of man.

## 2. The 7th Day is the only day without the usually creation ending – "And there was evening and there was morning."

Instead God stated that creation was "completed."

(Gen.2:1-2) "Thus the heavens and the earth were completed (kalah/ pual imperfect/ 3pl) [Intensive passive incomplete state], and all their hosts." (Gen.2:1; 1:1)

(Gen.2:2a) "By the seventh day God **completed** (kalah/ piel imperfect/3ms) [Intensive active incomplete state] His work which He had done."

**Incompleted state until**: "Heaven and earth will pass away but My word will not pass away." (Matt.24:35; Rom.8:18-27)

## 3. In six days, God restored the chaotic condition (tohu waw bohu) (Gen.1:2) for habitation of original creation (Gen.1:1; Isa.45:18).

The completion of God's restoration for habitation resolved three important theological issues.

- It resolved the chaotic conditions of divine discipline resulting from Satan's fall (Isa.14:12-15 and Ezek.28:11-19; Rev.12).
- It restored the earth for habitation of vegetation and chayah nephesh (Gen.2:1-3).
- It provided a way for mankind to enter into God infinite and eternal rest (Gen.2:1-3).

It was used three times (Gen.2:2-3).

4. The 7<sup>th</sup> Day was the only day that used the Hebrew word for work (milakal) [occupation].

- 5. Three divine activities are associated with the 7<sup>th</sup> Day rather than with creation.
  - **Rested** (shabath/ Kal impf) [Incompleted rest] (Gen. 2:2)

Gen.2:3

- o God's rest is associated with the 7<sup>th</sup> Day. It was rest from occupational activity not inactivity of work.
- Rested (kal pf/ completed rest/ Gen.2:3) It was a rest from finished work but not a finished rest. This is the same idea with the finished work for redemption but not the finished redemption (John 19:30; Eph.4:30).
- **Blessed** (barak/ piel impf) [Intensive active Incompleted blessing]
  - o On 5<sup>th</sup> Day, God blessed **them** (Gen.2:22). But on 7<sup>th</sup> Day, God blessed **the 7<sup>th</sup> Day**
  - o (Gen.2:3). Incomplete until Christ come to complete them and 7<sup>th</sup> or Sabbath Day.
- Sanctified (qadash/ kal pf) [Completed sanctification]
  - o God's sanctification was associated with 7<sup>th</sup> Day.
- 6. The Hebrew grammar is important in the description of sanctified.

(Gen.2:3) "Then God blessed the Seventh Day <u>and sanctified it</u> (direct object + pronominal 3ms suffix) [**Him**], because (ki) [causal conjunction] **in It** (preposition +3ms) [**in Him**] He rested from all His work which God had created and made."

**NOTE:** There is no neuter gender (it) in the Hebrew (only masculine and feminine).

This establishes a messianic prophecy associated with the Seventh (shabath) Day. The word Sabbath comes for it (shabbath) (Ex.20:8).

The 7<sup>th</sup> or Sabbath Day pointed to the Coming of Christ (**Him**). Christ would be the way into the infinite eternal rest of God (Gen.3:15; Gal.3:16; John 14:6; Matt.11:28-29; Heb.4:1-5).

(Mark 2:27-28) "Jesus said to them, 'The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath. So the Son of Man is Lord even of the Sabbath.""

(2 Thess.2:13) "But we should always give thanks to God for you, brethren beloved by the Lord, <u>because</u> God has chosen you from the beginning for salvation through **sanctification by the Spirit** and faith in the truth.'

(Heb.4:9) "There remains therefore a Sabbath Rest for the people of God."
